Turkmenistan Today:

Oil, Tribal Politics and Islamic Cultural Traditions

A Slide Lecture by Peter Poullada, Former President, San Francisco Bay Area Rug Society. The talk is based on a trip to Turkmenistan in April 2014 to all five of the major provinces of this Central Asian republic, each representing one of the historical tribal "Yurts" of the Turkmen people. Today Turkmenistan represents one of the least known and rarely visited of all the former republics of the Soviet Union. Less than 2500 tourists a year currently visit this fascinating country. Turkmenistan today is a mixture of a wealthy oil-producing nation, with a per capita income higher than that of Russia, its old colonial master, but with an underdeveloped infrastructure and a society still deeply influenced by the two main legacies of its past: that of the tribal/nomadic Turco-Mongol Islamic culture and society of the the Pre-Modern era and secondly, that of the approximately 120 years of Russian/Soviet domination. It is the contrasts of these two legacies that makes Turkmenistan such a fascinating destination.

This illustrated talk (approximately 50 minutes) takes the form of a travelogue, looking briefly at some of the major indicators of these legacies. It will reference the ancient traditions of the Turkmen tribal groupings and the deep and enduring role of Sufi –influenced Islam, which remains the most important "Folk" culture of the nation, in spite of 100 years of attempted suppression by the Russians and Soviets.

Over the past 15 years Peter has organized and led seven private tours to Central Asia. Peter is a member of the Middle East Studies Association, the Royal Central Asian Society, the International Society for Iranian Studies and the Association for the Study of Persianate Societies. In addition he is the Chair of the Advisory Council to the Near East Studies Department at Princeton University. He has published articles on Central Asia in the Journal of the Royal Society for Asian Studies and in Hali Magazine: the leading journal for the study of Islamic carpets and textiles.
